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THE DAVID ALEXANDER PRIZE

The David Alexander Prize is awarded annually for the best essay on the history of Atlantic Canada written in course by an undergraduate student in any university. The winner of the prize for 1992 is Michael O'Brien, a student at the Memorial University of Newfoundland, for his essay entitled "The Politics of Patriotism: Newfoundland's Debate on Conscription, 1916-1918". The winner is selected by a panel of judges including the Honourable George Stanley of New Brunswick, Professor Neil MacKinnon of St. Francis Xavier University and Professor Eric Sager of the University of Victoria.

The David Alexander Prize will be awarded for the twelfth time in 1993.

Conditions: Entries must be undergraduate essays between 1500 and 3500 words in length on some aspect of the history of Atlantic Canada, written in English or French. They may be research, interpretive or historiographical efforts. The author must be a part-time or a full-time undergraduate student in a degree programme at an accredited university or college. The essay must have been written to meet the requirements of an undergraduate credit course during the 1992-93 academic year. Previous winners of the Prize may not compete.

Submission: Entries shall be submitted by course instructors no later than 21 May 1993. No instructor shall submit more than two entries. Essays must be typed neatly and should not bear the instructor's comments or a grade. Entries should be sent to The Secretary, *Acadiensis*, Campus House, University of New Brunswick, P.O. Adjudication: Entries will be judged by a panel of three distinguished historians. The winner will be announced in the autumn of 1993. No runners-up or honorary mentions will be designated.

Prize: \$250.00.

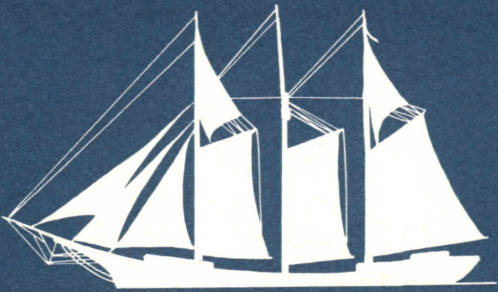
