Don Wells teaches Labour Studies at McMaster University, Hamilton, ON.

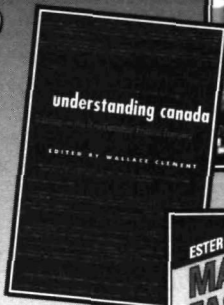

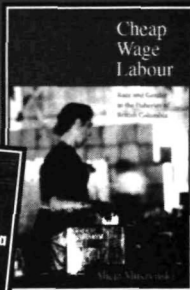
