Robert M. Pike is professor of sociology at Queen's University in Kingston, Ont. His interests include socio-historical research on the adoption of new technologies, the role of postal communications in social and economic development, and the social impact of public policy developments in higher education.

James Lemon has been a member of the Department of Geography at the University of Toronto since 1967. In 1972, his study of settlement and agriculture in colonial Pennsylvania won the Albert J. Beveridge Award from the American Historical Association for the best book in American history that year.
