Cities in World War II: A Colloquium

To commemorate the beginning of World War II, the city of Stuttgart is sponsoring an international colloquium on cities and their experiences during that conflict. Held 13-15 September 1989 in the assembly chamber of the city hall of Stuttgart, the conference will consist of six sessions dealing with eighteen cities. There are plans to publish the proceedings. The following is a summary of the sessions:

13 September

1. Cities under siege: Shanghai, Warsaw, and Leningrad
2. Cities under occupation: Copenhagen, Brussels, and Lyon

14 September

3. Industrial cities in wartime: Turin, Detroit, and Yokohama
4. Cities as staging bases: Halifax, Cairo, and Calcutta
5. Neutral cities: Zurich, Stockholm, and Istanbul
6. Cities under bombardment: Coventry, Hamburg, and Dresden
